The dataset you're about to explore is the result of hundreds of people devoting thousands of hours to data collection, cleaning, and analysis. It's the culmination of a process that has involved federal, state, and local government officials, Fortune 500 companies, nonprofit organizations, and charitable foundations; a process that has, in ways both large and small, touched every corner of the City of Detroit.

This release also represents a major step forward for Data Driven Detroit (D3) as an organization. Our mission is to provide accessible, high-quality information and analysis to drive informed decision-making. By making the Motor City Mapping data public, we and our partners have taken the first step toward creating the most open, comprehensive, and accessible property database that Detroit has ever had. We eagerly look forward to seeing how this data can lead to informed actions and a deeper understanding of our great city.

Introduction to Motor City Mapping

The Detroit Blight Removal Task Force commissioned D3, the Michigan Nonprofit Association, and LOVELAND Technologies to complete a citywide parcel survey in the winter of 2013 and 2014. The effort, called Motor City Mapping, leveraged relationships with the Quicken Loans family of companies and the Detroit Employment Solutions Corporation to assemble a dedicated team of over 200 resident surveyors, drivers, and quality control associates.

The initiative resulted in survey information for almost 380,000 parcels of land in the city of Detroit, identifying condition, occupancy, and use. The data provide a holistic look into Detroit's landscape, informing both large-scale planning efforts and on-the-ground action.

The data collected by the survey formed the background of the Blight Removal Task Force's report, "Every Neighborhood has a Future...and It Doesn't Include Blight." For more information on the Blight Removal Task Force, and to download the report, please visit <http://www.timetoendblight.com/>.

In the next stages of Motor City Mapping, Data Driven Detroit and LOVELAND will introduce an essential feedback function into data collection. In the coming months, you can expect an online platform and downloadable app that will allow you to contribute, correct, and update information to ensure that this dataset adequately reflects neighborhood conditions.
